Omnibus Consolidated Appropriations for FY 2011 . <i>See HR 3082.AS or S.AMDT.4805</i>	\$6.288	This bill was a flash in the legislative pan. While it did not pass, it is important to recognize what could have happened if Republican Senators did not protest earmarks in the bill. The Omnibus bill text cut the CDC's core program line to pre-2005 funding levels then adds \$630 million back to the CDC's budget from the Prevention Trust. This represented a \$142 million cut to CDC's core programs if you include Prevention Fund dollars. Not counting PF dollars, the core program cut is \$454 million.	\$6.85	Died in Senate 12/16/10
FY 2011 Continuing Resolution at FY 2010 levels through March 4, 2011. <i>See H.R.3082.ENR</i>	\$6.742	Called the "Senate amendment to the House amendment to the Senate amendment to H. R. 3082..." on the Rules Committee Website, this final CR is in effect only through March 4 of 2011. At that point the Administration, the Republican-led House and the Senate will need to enact another bill to fund the government from March 5 to September 31. Without bill text to the contrary, the Administration will determine how much of the Prevention Fund (\$750 million available for FY '11) will be allocated to the CDC. How much funding will be allocated by March 4 is unclear, as is what happens after that date.	Unknown?	Sent to President for Signature Public Law 111-322
